Course Description

In this course, students will learn how to develop an interior design project for a specific purpose, focusing on style, materials, colours and other design elements to serve the purpose. They will be introduced to the fundamental design strategies for residential, retail and visual merchandising purposes. They will be guided to research into innovative materials and exemplary projects, and learn to present their ideas using different presentation tools of the professionals.

In-class exercises (20%)	<p>Under the guidance of the lecturer, students working in groups will be engaged in practice related to the topic of each class. Final Project-research & development (30%)	<p>Students working in groups will prepare the final contents of all the works developed during the course in order to be displayed. They will have to improve on their mood boards, collage, mock-up models and design briefs.</p>	1,2
Final Project-exhibition layout design & presentation (40%)	<p>Students working in groups will develop a final layout of the exhibition using creative methods to present a holistic display of their works documenting their journeys from concept to the final results for each project. They will have to choose one particular design to work on, combine the different elements and tools learnt and present their project in the term-end exhibition and receive comments from the instructor and fellow classmates.</p> <p>The project shall be completed by Lesson 12 (Exhibition date: 21-28 Nov). All course artworks will form a group exhibition.</p> <p>After the exhibition, students have to submit a documentation which documents their project, including sketches, concept, project development, problems encountered, photos (documentation) of their final work and a personal reflection.</p> <p>Word limit: 500-1000 words <u>DUE DATE: 28 Nov</u></p> <p><i>*10% of the grade will be deducted per day after the due date. Submissions will not be accepted after 3 Dec 2019.</i></p>	3, 4
